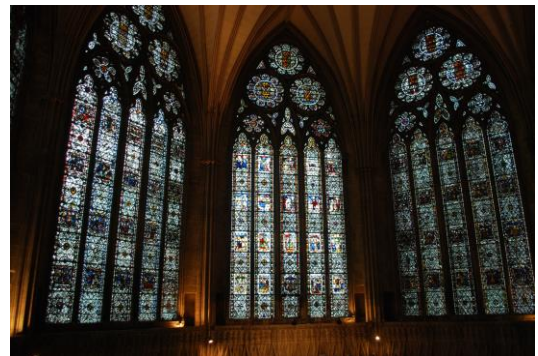

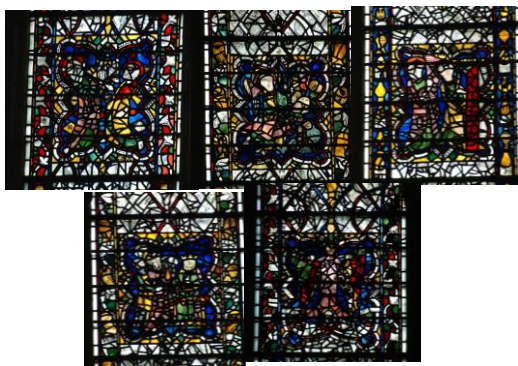
Window of Infancy of Christ/Death

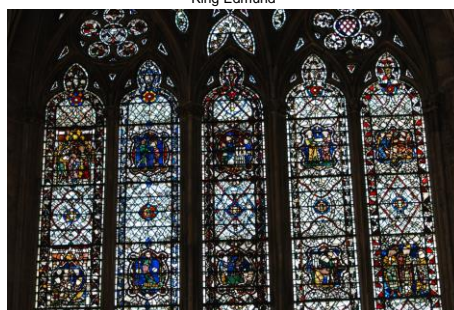

The York Mystery Plays

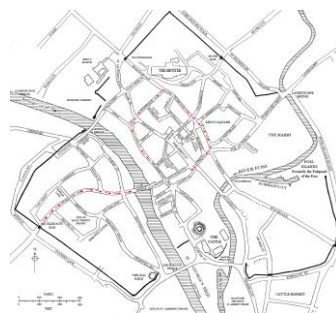


The Last Judgement brought forth by The Company of Merchant Adventurers with Pocklington School – July 2010

- 48 separate plays
- XIVth – XVth century
- Performed on wagons
- Corpus Christi Feast
- Plays organised by craft-guilds
- Plainchant and polyphonic items
- Wagons stopped at 12 stations



The Stations

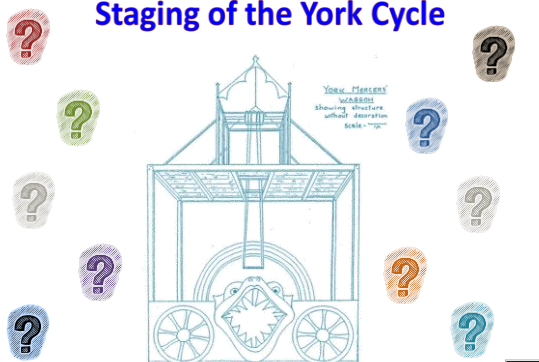


Map of York adapted from Tillot (1961)

- Stations related to landmarks or owners/tenants of particular houses
- Scaffolds assembled at the stations
- Rooms rented to watch the plays from the windows
- A non-paying audience stood in the streets to watch



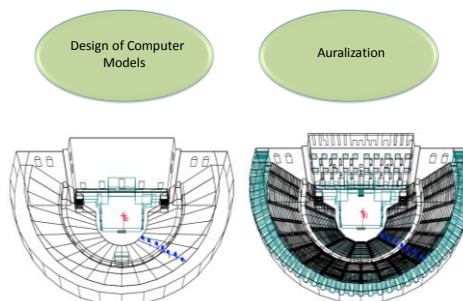

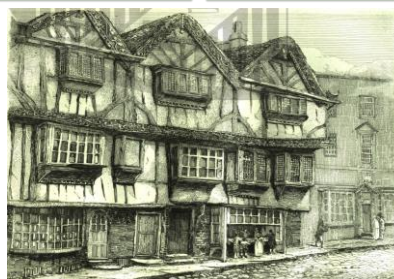

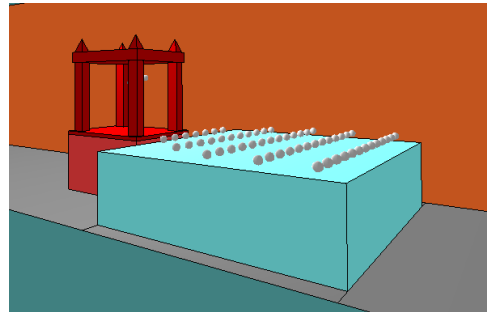

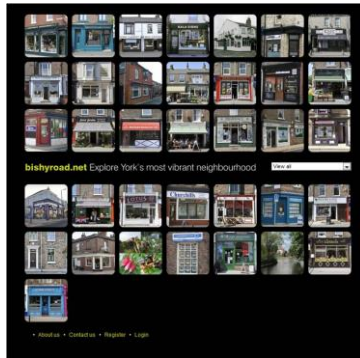

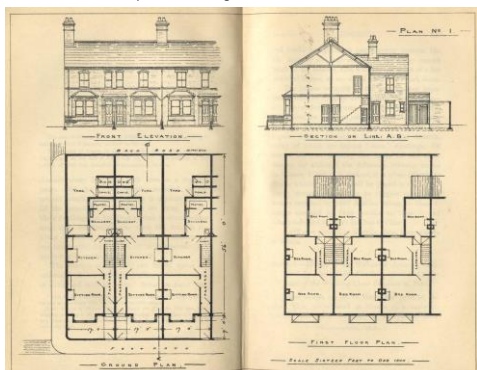

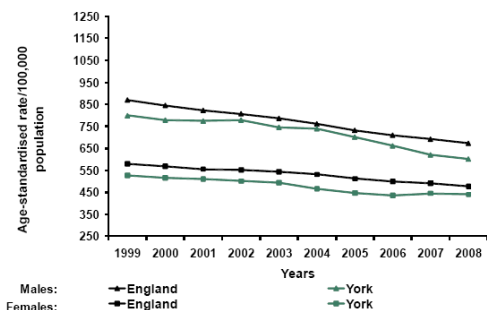

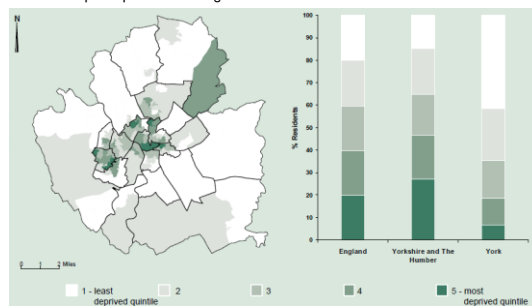

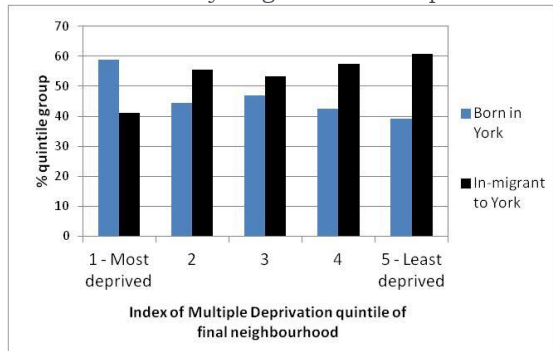
Place of birth of people dying in York



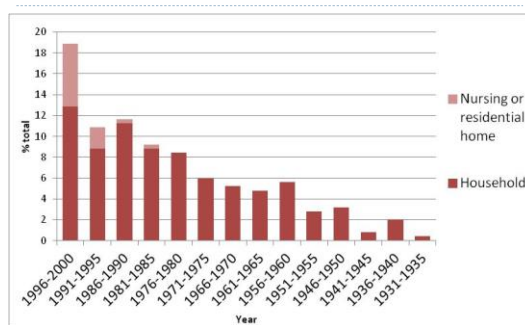
Place of birth by social class

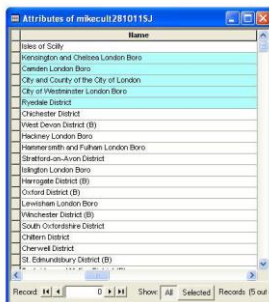
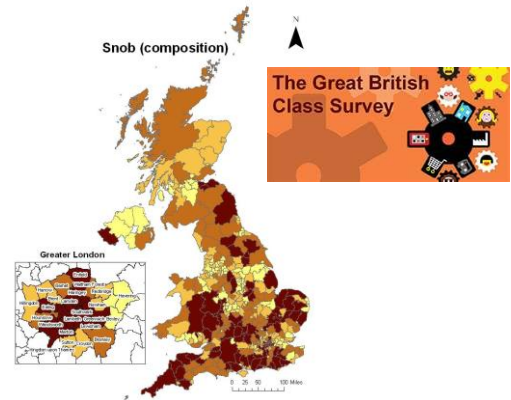
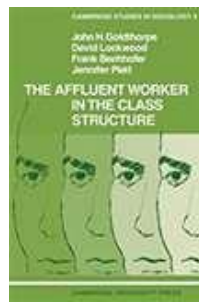
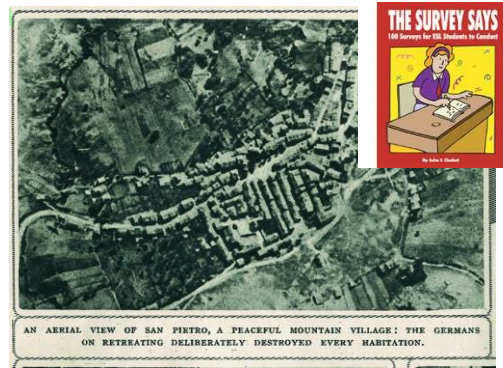


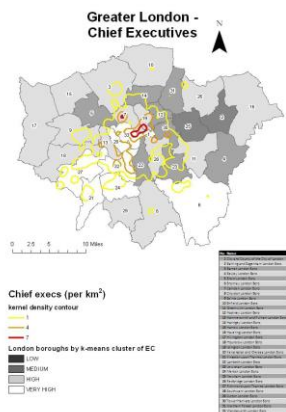
Place of birth by neighbourhood deprivation

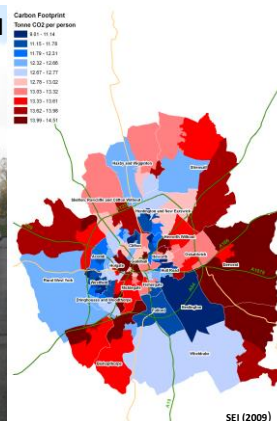

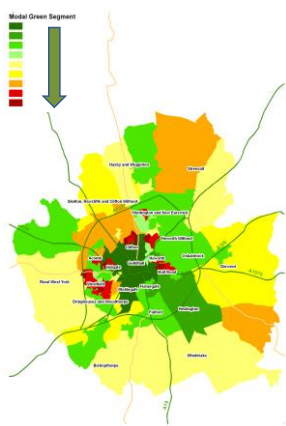
The York Neighbourhood Carbon Footprint

Mentor

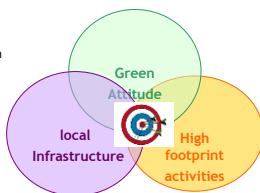
Each team was allocated a mentor to facilitate the group and encourage discussion and action

Speakers

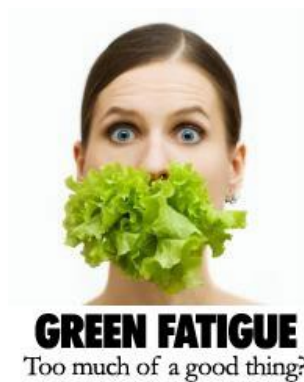
Each team given access to a pool of speakers who provided advice to the group on waste recycling, energy efficiency and composting.

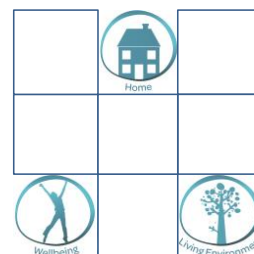

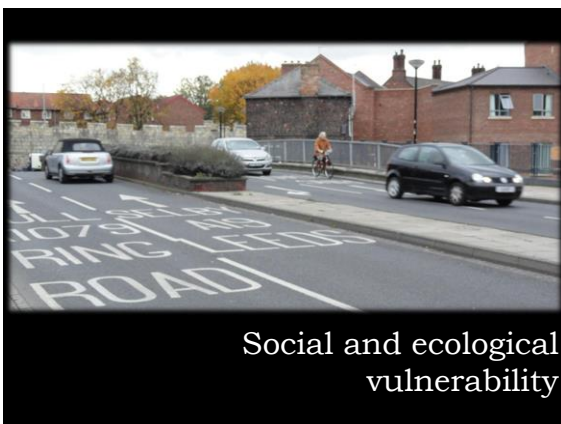
